## Email Security Unknown Incoming Emails

I looked at my email today (I use Outlook) and saw a message from *Anet Arbell*, who I don't know, and with no text in the Subject line. It had no attachment. If you get emails like this I strongly suggest that you go through the following procedure to find the address of the mysterious *Anet Arbell*.

This procedure applies to Outlook, Outlook Express Livemail in [brackets]

- 1) Right click on the message, a window opens, select 'message Options' [Properties]
- 2) Left click another window opens and you will see a section 'Internet Headers' [click on details]
- 3) Scroll down this section. Look at each line and eventually you will see From: "anat arbell" [atarbell@hotmail.com](mailto:atarbell@hotmail.com)  
You might also see the line Return Path: which may say the same thing (Don't be worried by the other lines of text, they indicate the path that the email has travelled to reach you)

Either way I did not recognize the email address, I did not recognize the sender so I deleted the message without opening.

## Dealing with Junk Mail

Most modern email Software has a way of dealing with unwanted incoming email. This is by means of having a Junk Mail folder.

It is very easy to arrange email that comes from unwanted people that their email goes straight to the Junk mail Folder

To do this:

- 1) Right Click on the selected email
- 2) A window will open, select 'Junk Email', select 'Add sender to Blocked Senders List'

From then on email from that sender will go to your Junk Email folder. Mind you this can be altered if you select 'Junk Email Options' [Livemail users click on the little black triangle under the 'Junk' tab then select 'Safety Options']

Don't forget to look at the Junk Mail folder from time to time. If you do not want to open any of the emails then just select the Junk e-mail folder using right click and then left click on the 'Empty Junk E-mail folder'.
